ART 4100-01/4100-02 Allbritton Field Study—Fall 2013: Modern English & European Masters @ Philadelphia & Wilmington

Travel Dates: Oct 10-13--Philadelphia and Wilmington art museums and historic sites (hotel in Philadelphia)

Description:

A one-credit-hour course designed for qualified art majors enrolled in ART 4355 (Arts in 19th-Century England) and ART 4362 (Modern European Art to 1945) to focus on the art of England's first avant-garde in museum collections and develop understanding of modern European artists from first-hand examination



Students will learn to:

- recognize, appreciate, and "read" Pre-Raphaelite paintings and understand the movement's place in 19th-century art
- articulate the dynamics among ideas and works of key figures of modern European art

Objectives:

By learning about and then exploring important collections of modern European art, students will develop:

- a working knowledge of important 19th- and early 20th-century artists
- an understanding of the contrast between art history in England and elsewhere in the 19th and 20th centuries

Structure: Class Meetings + Travel

The focus and goal of 4100 is the field study itself: the academic work done in the designated destination. To prepare for the time in the museums of Philadelphia and Wilmington, students will complete a planned list of presentations that will ready the group for the travel itinerary and orient the group to the subjects about which they will be the "experts" on tour. Students will know in advance how they will further on the trip their studies in ART 4355 or ART 4362.

Structure: Paper

Students in 4100 will choose monographic paper topics for ART 4355 or ART 4362 that can be expanded by their work in ART 4100, e.g., a student who chooses to write a paper about Millais will a) know where to find his work in Philadelphia and Wilmington; b) build a first-hand understanding of that artist's work *to share with the group*; and c) compose a section of the ART 4355 or ART 4362 paper that reflects what has been gained by direct contact with relevant work.

Attendance

To be eligible for the travel portion of ART 4100, students must participate in all scheduled meetings (above)

Evaluation:

Class presentations 30%; the "museums component" of ART 4355/4362 paper 20%; academic performance on the trip 30%; general comportment on the trip 20%
