Recommended strategy:

Define a central question related to your topic and direct all effort toward answering the question. Example: "Are there strong continuities of style and subject between Whistler's paintings and his prints?"

Bibliography and Documentation:

Make this an immediate priority:

- Identify the best sources
- Locate the best sources and determine how to obtain those not in Baylor's library

(use on-line resources—other nearby libraries? Interlibrary Loan?)

Create a notetaking system that will keep track of all notes by source and page

Making the Writing Manageable:

- Develop a list of key ideas
- Imagine each as the subject of a paragraph or sentence
- Construct preliminary sentences to get started
- Identify the material that must be assembled to complete each section

Making the Writing Successful:

- Pay attention to examples, including sources you consult (journal articles)
- Use the Baylor Writing Center
- Get another student to read your paper for
 - a) general clarity
 - b) grammar and spelling
 - c) thoroughness

NOTES:

Criteria to be applied in grading: strength of thesis, thoroughness, clarity, appropriateness and breadth of examples. See RUBRIC.

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REPORT

Organize a report from material gathered for your paper. Talk through a major issue or concept, analyze and discuss a key work for your topic, etc.

Present in PowerPoint, 6 slides max, to be submitted by 9:00 am the day of your report, for printing ($b\&w \times 15$) and distribution as handout before your report.

General quidelines for PowerPoint:

Font: Times or Arial 20

Images: Labeled by artist, title, dimensions (inches—convert from metric), collection

Other: no fancy/distracting background

You may submit a draft in advance for feedback.

Grade criteria: clarity of thought and speech, business-like style, meets assignment criteria
